ASPIRE Reaches California

We are excited to announce that ASPIRE of San Francisco California established an affiliate on March 13, 2012. The affiliate was spearheaded by Dao Jensen, who at the age of 19 was pregnant, single, and unsure of how she would have afforded college tuition had it not been for a full scholarship.

Although Dao married the father, completed her education, and had four additional children, she is again a single parent and found herself wanting to find a meaningful way to give back to the community. Desiring to help single parents finish their higher education, she worked with a community giving-based program to set goals that she is passionate about, determine the metrics for a successful project, and locate resources to achieve the goals. Her research led her to ASPIRE, whose mission and purpose matched the goals for her endeavor.

The board members of SFCA are very eager to assist single parents who are earning their undergraduate degrees in the Bay Area. They will begin interviewing students in July for Fall 2012 scholarships.

ASPIRE Workshops

ASPIRE of Green Country Oklahoma board members held their first board workshop in Tulsa, Oklahoma on February 4. With the feedback received, ASPIRE training materials were revised to provide a better explanation of steps to awarding scholarships and using the online tools.

ASPIRE of Metro Atlanta board members met on April 28 in Atlanta, Georgia and ASPIRE of San Francisco California board members met on May 19 for their first ASPIRE workshop. Each affiliate was presented with materials and information about the online training modules, the STAR student and donor database, and the procedure for determining and awarding scholarship recipients. ASPIRE of North Delta Mississippi will hold its workshop on June 7.

All three workshops were well received by the board members. Susan Reid, Board President of the Metro Atlanta affiliate, commented that "the workshop that Christine did for us was invaluable. We are eager to help single parents but we were overwhelmed at the best way to move forward. The training



modules and the on-site training gave us the confidence and the tools to do just that. We will be giving our first scholarships this fall and we feel confident that we are on the right track. We couldn't have done it without the help of everyone at ASPIRE."

"With the ASPIRE scholarship and their support, I was able to finish my pursuit of a college education and obtain a means to make a living that will support my children. I am now a full-time substitute teacher at Kelsey Norman Elementary in Joplin, MO teaching a 5th grade eMints class."

What influenced you to enroll in college?

The need to support my children on my own.

What was your inspiration to choose your degree? Working with kids, especially those that have a harder time at learning.

What is the meaning of a college education?

It is a way to make a living for my children. It has also instilled self-confidence in myself and given my children the desire to pursue higher education after finishing high school.

What is the most memorable experience of this journey?

Looking up at my children while I was walking across the stage at graduation. They were clapping and cheering and so proud of my accomplishment.

What did you find most difficult about being a single parent & student?

Being a single parent has many challenges. Being the constant parent, without having anyone else to back you up or consult for decisions. Spending late nights studying and being up early for work and class proved to be one of the most challenging obstacles. I believe this helped me to enjoy even the few minutes I am able to spend with my kids and to make the most of the time we have together.

What advice would you give other single parents on their educational path?

Believe in yourself and your future. You CAN do this! And even when you think no one really cares, it's great to know that the people of ASPIRE <u>DO</u> believe in you!

How were you able to use the ASPIRE scholarship?

The ASPIRE scholarship was very helpful to me and my children. One semester, I was able to purchase school supplies and clothes for my children and myself. Another semester, I was able to pay rent, which I was unsure of how I would be able to otherwise.

Carrying Your Love With Me

Love is not an object that can be seen; it is felt. A feeling that either deepens or fades away. Love can be felt all around through everything if one allows it to. When heartache and tragedy strike it can be extremely hard to see this. That moment when you close your eyes and you can see, feel your hero's love, that moment is the moment that carries you on, pulls you out of the darkness. My husband Cpl Peter Courcy was a US Solider in the Army. He was a member of the 2-506 Infantry unit. On February 10, 2009, while deployed to Afghanistan, Peter was out on patrol when his humvee was struck by a VBIED. He was killed instantly. That day I became a widow.

That day my life was broken. I was lost, confused, and heartbroken. Through the following months our son (who was 5 months old when Peter was killed) was my only reason for living. I knew I had to take care of him. With time, my smile went from fake to real and I started living

again. On memorial weekend, May 30th, 2010, my only sibling, my older brother BJ, died accidentally. That heartache overwhelmed my life once again. Less than a year and a half apart I planned two funerals in my early twenties. Unsure of what purpose there is to life if it's filled with sadness, I questioned everything. There was one thing I could never question; the love that I had for both of them. That love motivated me to be happy again, to cherish the time that I had with them, and to honor them by living, by carrying their love with me!

When Peter was deployed I took a break from school to care for our newborn son. Peter knew that school was important to me and encouraged me to go back when I was ready. With the help of ASPIRE and BAE I went back to school. This May I walked the stage and graduated with an A.A. in Criminal Justice. With the continued help of ASPIRE I will further my college education and continue to get my B.A. in Psychology. I plan to help others who have experienced grief, heartache, and pain, and to use my experience to help other military families in great need. Without the ASPIRE scholarship sponsored by BAE, none of this would be possible. From the bottom of my heart, thank you for this chance. As long as there is love anything is possible.
